### THE DAWN CLUB EXHIBITION

The Dawn Club, an exhibition by Fiona MacDonald, will open at the Henry Lawson Centre, Gulgong on the 1st December 2021 at 11am to 31st January 2022.

'Lawson was a writer of men,' writes Catriona Moore of Sydney University, 'specifically bushmen. The city was a place to be avoided for its wives and its wowsers: those who tamed men and denied their pleasures. Yet up close, Lawson's stories and poems are more nuanced than the simple Bulletin stereotype. Lawson's predilection for authentic representation tapped into an emerging, distinctively modern Australian womanhood. Lawson's early admiration is embodied in stories like 'The Drover's Wife' (1892) – depicting a tough and reflective woman who seems to be embedded in the very land itself, and whose resourcefulness was in synch with the progressive ferment of the times.'

Fiona MacDonald's research into the archives of the Henry Lawson Centre showed her the influence many women had had on the life and career of Henry. A chance find of an obscure theatre playbill became the inspiration for the works in the exhibition. Dozens of hand printed tea-towels depicting portraits of the women who impacted Henry (and then so much more) will hang across the Henry Lawson Centre's hall.

Catriona Moore again writes that 'Fiona MacDonald rinses conventional literary wisdom to restore a female

perspective that is usually overlooked.... They evoke the domestic realm, but each woman depicted exasperatedly tells us that she is not simply one of Lawson's women, but a person in own her own right'

### **RESIDENTS URGED TO SUPPORT SMALL BUSINESS AND 'GO LOCAL FIRST'**

The region's business and tourism industry bodies are joining forces with Council to urge residents to spend locally and support small businesses affected by lockdown.

Council is partnering with Business Mudgee, Gulgong Chamber of Commerce, Rylstone Kandos Chamber of Commerce and Mudgee Region Tourism to reinforce the message of the renewed 'GO LOCAL FIRST' campaign. The campaign will highlight the crucial role small business plays in the nation's economy and the continued need for Australians to GO LOCAL FIRST to support those small businesses as the Delta variant of COVID-19 wreaks havoc with the ability of small businesses to keep trading.

Local consumer data revealed that residents of the Mid-Western Region spent \$42.6 million outside the region in the December 2020 quarter. If 10 per cent of this amount (\$4.26 million) was instead spent locally, it would create 34 new jobs and provide a major boost to the region's economy.

Mid-Western Regional Council Mayor, Des Kennedy said now more than ever it is so important to spend locally. "We know so many small businesses are doing it tough right now as we mark almost five weeks in lockdown. So I urge anyone who has the means to, please spend locally wherever you can on goods and services," Cr Kennedy said. "By spending locally you are supporting a local business owner to keep trading, to keep employing locals and to help our economy emerge from lockdown."

Mudgee Business President, Ali Broinowski said: "Local businesses have been closed in order to protect our community, and now we are encouraging our community to protect and support our businesses by purchasing locally first every



time. If there is a local business which provides the goods or services you need - please support these first."

Gulgong Chamber of Commerce Secretary, Paul Fookes said: "Small businesses are the backbone of our economy and by shopping locally we can ensure local employment and a stronger community."

Rylstone Kandos Business Chamber, Secretary Margot Palk said: "It's powerful to keep money in our towns. If you spend it with a local business, they're likely to spend it locally too. This can have such a great impact on so many businesses and individuals."

#### Did you have to do any training for your job? If so, what/how long?

# **THE ARTS INSIDER**

### So much going on in the Wide World of Mid-Western Art!

There was the opening of Sculptures in the Garden on 5 November and the highly anticipated Official Opening of Mudgee Arts Precinct on 12 November, after being delayed by the pesky statewide lockdown. Both nights were unseasonally wet and wild but a huge success by all accounts. By the time of publication it was rumoured that most of the region's politicians were going to descend on Mudgee for the Grand Opening, including the state Minister for the Arts, Don Harwin as well as Dugald Saunders and our Member for Calare, Andrew Gee, ahead of election year. Even more exciting was hearing Ben Quilty would be opening Guido Maestri's exhibition - Ben is possibly Australia's biggest name in the contemporary painting world, well known for his tireless political campaigning and most recently raising over \$4.5 million for the people of Afghanistan displaced by the wars. He was also heavily involved in the opening of Ngununggula the new regional art gallery in the Southern Highlands.

Sculptures in the Garden 2021, now in its eleventh year, was tracking towards record sales this year which is astonishing considering the deluge we faced over the last two weekends. Indeed, by the time I went through on the first Saturday, all of my favourites had already been sold! I suppose our inability to indulge in anything other than online shopping has led to this surge in retail therapeutic activites, and what is better than investing in some three dimensional art for our very green gardens?

Sculptures in the Garden has been working with Mid-Western Regional Council for quite some time now, and Mudgee has the benefit of having several sculptures as part of their public art collection, which are mostly exhibited in the Lawson Park along the Cudgegong River. Whilst some of the earlier collected works are a bit hit-and-miss, they now have some fine sculptures on show. The newest sculpture is John Fitzmaurice's 'Encounter' which has pride of place outside Mudgee Arts Precinct. The work pays homage to "the curious giants of the sea" and although it is a tenuous link to the region, the sculpture actually works really well here, juxtaposed against the highly linear design of BKA's ultra-contemporary new gallery

### DRAGONRIDGE POTTERY

Rylstone Potter, Sue Foldhazy, moved with her family to the Rylstone area in 2000 for work as a schoolteacher at the local high school. Sue decided to follow her love of pottery and started a ceramic course at Tafe. After 8 years of part-time study she started showing and selling her work. She has exhibited in many exhibitions in Rylstone, Mudgee, Gulgong and Dunedoo.

The name 'Dragonridge Pottery' is made up of her love of Dragonflies and Rhodesian Ridgebacks who have been her constant studio buddies over the years. She has a well set up studio in the garden of her home in Rylstone, where she produces both functional and building. The red colours of the walls is also reflected by the sculpture giving the forecourt much warmth, and is a really attractive welcome in to Mudgee from Gulgong.

The other new work that has been recently installed at the gallery is Stephen King's 'Balancing the Books V', a single stringy bark tree trunk carved into stacks. It's a terrific sculpture which was Mid-Western Regional Council and Sculptures in the Garden Acquisition Prize in 2020. Eventually the sculptures along the Cudgegong will lead up to the precinct, so this will be another feather in the cap for the town and a real asset for the cultural tourist. The sculpture walk will be even more established once the building on the corner (the old child care centre) becomes the additional space for the arts precinct, comprising artists workshop spaces, scheduled for completion in the middle of next year.

### 2nd PRIZE WINNER OF 2021 NORMAN McVICKER LITERARY SHORT STORY COMPETITION

Local resident, Raynor Heath is a 17 year old from Crudine who is currently completing her HSC. With a love of reading and writing, Raynor

told MWM her favourite topics are philosophy, history and world literature which has led to her gaining early entry to the Australian National University next year to continue her tertiary education.

She was inspired to write her story based on her interest in the Russian author Vladimir Nabokov and the concept of the male gaze. She researched the history of the novel 'Lolita' and the theories surrounding gender and sex. She decided to enter the 2021 Norman McVicker Literary Competition when she saw it on social media and decided to give it a shot - here is her story:

### A STUDY OF NABOKOV

You know Nabokov became a professor of butterflies later in life. It's true. The study of butterflies is called Lepidopterology. In antiquity they translated this to  $\lambda \epsilon \pi i \delta \alpha \varsigma$ (scale) and  $\pi \tau \epsilon \rho \delta v$  (wing) to a neat  $\lambda o \gamma i a$  (logia). Neat, charismatic and academic. Rolls off of the tongue really.

The trouble with the study of butterflies however, is the cruelty. You take a small, winged insect. It's lifespan is already so short, and you cut the fate cord. Short, abrupt and clean. You pin it to the wall, meticulously sticking little pins through its gossamer wings. You take the very quality that makes a butterfly, itself. It's essence is captured in your hands, and you place it high in a shadowbox in your study. You tap away at your typewriter, aggressively, looking at the butterfly and smiling. You think you did such a good job, a little lady butterfly trapped in a box.

It's beauty is always preserved but its purpose never fulfilled, the same with the larvae you line your walls with. In glass jars their development is halted in phemaldehyde. It's a foetus, still clothed in its womb, an aborted biological vision. Sartre would say that this larvae is no longer a larvae, its essence of what it is supposed to be has been taken. The same as the butterfly, once its wings have been taken. It is no longer a butterfly merely a version of a butterfly. A little stunted insect.

Then I must wonder, is a woman still a woman if she is placed in a box, her wings pinned and the shadow box eclipsing her purpose? I'm not so sure anymore. Nabokov gave Dolores Haze her shadow box by calling her Lolita. Placing her away from childhood, her identity and her purpose as a child. Was it Nabokov that clipped her innocent wings? Or was it Humbert Humbert? I'll find out, I think, I just have to read on. It travels really, to the tip of the tongue to the roof of the mouth, Lepi-dopter-ology.

I believe I discovered how gore and 'womanhood' was explicitly linked in the summer of the early 60s. America was hostile then. The Cuban Missile Crisis making my mother grip her chair, black kids were only just joining Universities and Walmart was created. Already it was clear to see how savage nature was. The pollution of mankind was everywhere and yet to avoid sticky fingers, carpets were lifted and the dust was brushed under. It was also the first time I had begun to menstruate. Three red splotches had confirmed the terrible event. With shaky hands I went to my mother, her nervous temperament increasing with each word I uttered.

In a flourish of anxiety she explained to me the 'mechanics of a woman', glossing over details and instead suggesting I pretend to be sick the rest of the week. I began to cry. I had no idea why this event, as bloody and awful as it was, was to change me. I didn't want to be changed, in fact childhood had suited me just fine. It seemed absurd to me that this should strike me and later I would reflect on how naive I was. I wondered now if I had to become gentler, stop wearing shorts and become, god forbid, a mirror image of my mother. The soft smiles of women on the television and the clicky heels of women on the sidewalk would be my new companions. Suddenly my organs would be turned inside out every so often, just so I could one day house a child.

Girls who were my age didn't look like me in movies, they were curvaceous and sultry. The movie, that one with the girl in the heart shaped glasses. I remembered seeing it with my father. She was prepubescent, in a bikini on her lawn and a lollipop dangling from her lips. My father had sat, his eyes glazed and his suit crumpled from walking me to the theatre. I wondered how he saw this girl, who was supposed to be the same age as me. Did I see him wet his lips? Did I see him shift? Maybe, he didn't realise she was the same age as me in the movie. I now recall that that movie was Lolita. The Kubrick version, the one with Sue Lyon who was 14 at the time. I remember at the time I was impossibly disgusted at the Humbert Humbert who snatched a young Lolita. I spoke to my father about this as he put his hat back on to step outside the theatre after the movie had ended. I asked why that was allowed, he was so much older than her, and to be stolen like that? Father stood there. He contemplated. Then replied, 'Well, honey, see the way she was dressed, the way she acted, she was askin' for it'. I had stopped mid walk, then asked again. She was my age though Daddy, besides they got people to dress em' like that. Father shrugged and continued to walk.

I had been subjected to a cruel reality of the 60s and still today, there was something that distracted from the truth. It was the beauty of the butterfly, a biological and inherent trait. It was a trait not chosen by the butterfly that attracted the professor and that decided the fate of the beautiful butterfly. To pin the butterfly's wings, until it is immobile is when the truth is revealed. That the butterfly was not the rare seductress of the winged world, rather it was just a butterfly. To gaze at the butterfly, the professor directing its wings, it can be seen as anything. But if looked at very, very closely the butterfly is a child, new from its larvae. That is the truth of a savage nature, the beauty covers the ugliness. Butterflies in the eyes of the ancient Greeks were tough with their scaled wings. To primite ears though, it travels really, to the tip of the tongue to the roof of the mouth Lepi-dopter-ology.

### A LIFE'S PASSION DELIVERS GOLD

Hill End-based historian and researcher Malcolm Drinkwater has delivered yet another exceptional documentary experience with his recent release, After the Rush - Evolution of a Goldfield. Through two disks (DVDs) Malcolm's mellifluous voice takes us on a 48 chapter journey, summoning the living past as he covers the evolution of the people and life in Hill End.

Malcolm's research is gold standard, and he has left no stone unturned, or hand scrawled note unread in revisiting assumed truths of the times.

'My aim here is to, with friends, summon the living past, and in doing so set the record straight, to account for the way it was. Not the way it has, in some cases, been misinterpreted,' notes Malcolm.

Malcolm has nurtured genuine relationships with his interview subjects and been rewarded with a quality to the truth-telling that is rich and complex, and most notably, based on lived experience.

'[Through the series] ...we interview first-hand remaining participants to share their stories and lifestyle that is now alien to most.'

In Malcolm's words, the documentary production... 'resulted in a 4 & ½ hour, 48 chapter epic relating all manner of life in and on a goldfield, pre and post gold rush.'

Malcolm Drinkwater is no ordinary man: he lives in the small town of Hill End, owns and operates Hill End History Museum, is a passionate self-taught researcher on the history of some of Australia's best-known goldfields, their characters and way of life, and is a published author and documentary film-maker.

Few people can match his lifelong passion for and commitment to in-depth research in his area of interest, Hill End, its goldrushes and gold fields. So well researched is his work, that others have crafted books and published works of their own using his unearthed rare findings, photographs, records and written materials. However, nowhere else can you be certain that his meticulously collated research interprets an accurate account of the period.

It is this depth of knowledge, clear passion for sharing history and accessible story-telling that sets Malcolm's work apart. The new DVD is insightful and enjoyable and joins his three other books and in-depth DVDs in a fascinating library on colonial history and gold rush life.

*The Golden Days Revisited* (2020) 70mins, revision of the original 1985 produced *Golden Days*, this version revisits material and uncovers new sites not previously promoted.

The three major acquisitions will be added to the Lawson Park Sculpture Walk in Mudgee – the largest public art display in regional NSW. The winners included:

HARRIE FASHER from Portland who took out the major \$25,000 Sculptures in the Garden and Mid-Western Regional Council prize with 'Ahead' (*top two photos*)

NICOLE O'REGAN of Sodwalls won the \$10,000 Friends of Sculptures in the Garden prize for her work 'Pensive' (both lower left photos)

FRANCOIS JAGGI from Armidale was awarded the \$5,000 Moolarben prize for his piece 'Runner' (lower second from right photo)

ALAN KUCZYNSKI from Seaforth won the \$5,000 Buchanan Artistic Merit Acquisition Prize for 'The Great Escape' which will be placed in the grounds of the Mudgee Hospital. (*lower right photo*)

Over 280 sculptures were on show with artists hailing from across Australia, the breadth of talent who entered the event this year was of exceptional quality and demonstrated the exhibition's reputation as the leading sculpture event in regional Australia.







- Approximately 15 000 kg of gold were mined in the Gulgong fields between 1870-80.





### **KANDOS PUBLIC SCHOOL**



Staff have been engaged in high-impact professional development to meet the needs of all students through evidence-based and engaging classroom practice. The implementation of InitiaLit has been at the forefront of improving reading and writing data in K-2 Literacy this year. The consistent instruction of MiniLit, MultiLit, Dr Tessa Daffern's Triple Word Form Theory and targeted intervention has also been a driving force in improving literacy skills school-wide. This year, phonics, phonological awareness and comprehension has been enriched with the purchase of new decodable texts and quality literature resources.

Focussed and explicit mathematical activities are being delivered daily across the whole school that are differentiated and cater for all learning needs. Numeracy is highly regarded as a pathway to the future and Kandos is providing mathematical picture books, targeted early numeracy, digital game-based learning and tasks that focus on working mathematically.

Kandos Public School is part of the pilot Remote Access Gap technological infrastructure rollout that has allowed staff and students to use the latest technology in classrooms. Student have access to engaging STEAM activities and the newest software and hardware inclusive of a computer lab, iPads and digital gamebased learning. In conjunction with this rollout, Kandos Public School is supported by Sporting Schools and participate in regular swimming lessons and tennis coaching which are development pathway supporting total beginners and future high-performance athletes.

Kandos Public School is currently in partnership with Food Bank Australia, providing a daily breakfast for all students. Social and emotional groups that build resilience, friendships and positive relationships are facilitated by the on-site and full-time chaplain. During Level 3 Covid-19 restrictions, Kandos Public School have been committed to offering virtual excursions, on-site theme days and special 'virtual' visitors including past student and now children's author, Penny Harrison.



# December's by Naomi Rouse COMMUNITY CAREER

Each month we ask a member of our community to talk about their work in our beautiful region. This month we talk to Marina whose passion for horses has allowed her to travel the world, live in cities and the bush, but never have a lie-in.

### Tell us what you do, where you work and how long you have been in this type of work.

I am a track work rider. I have been track work riding since I was 18 years old when I left school. I am originally from France and worked there for 5 years before I moved to Australia where I already had a job with trainer David Payne in Rosehill, Sydney. I was there for 6 months before moving to Mudgee and started to work for Gooree Park. I then worked for trainer Gayna Williams in Mudgee who sponsored me for my permanent residency. I now work for trainer Brett Thompson in Gulgong.

### Tell us what a typical day looks like in your job.

Working in the racing industry means you have to be an early riser. Generally you have to start work anywhere between 4am-7am depending on the track. I also have my own horses who need to be fed before I go to work! Once at work generally you are required to clean out stables, ride the horses then finish the stable chores and carry out any of the treatments needed for the horses. There will often be an afternoon shift, consisting of cleaning out the stables again, feeding and watering the horses and changing the horse rugs depending on the season. Sometimes we are needed to take the horses to the races and strap them (get them ready for the race).



How did you get into track work? Did you study? What qualification/s did you need? I started riding track work at the age of 17 in my free time for fun. At the time, in France you could do track


work on a voluntary basis. I did this for a year and when I left school I decided to do it as a full time job. I asked the trainer and he offered me a job.

### Why did you move to the region? What do you love most?

I moved to the region to extend my working holiday visa and loved the region and the people. The people were warm and welcoming and I made some great friends. There is always things to do such as markets, concerts, wineries, football games and of course the races!

### What advice would you give anyone wanting to become a track work rider?

I would recommend anyone wanting to become a track worker be motivated, dedicated, not frightened to see the sunrise and not mind working long days. However there are many opportunities and possibilities in the racing industry to evolve and grow your career. I have particularly liked the fact it has enabled me to travel, doing what I love. There are plenty of jobs, trainers are always looking for reliable riders.



### EXPLORER CADETSHIP LEADING THE WAY

Applications are now open for the Thoroughbred Industry Careers (TIC) Explorer Cadetship for 2022, a 12-month program of stud and stable horsemanship and industry training.



The Explorer Cadetship is the only entry-level education program of its kind and has quickly cemented its place as the pre-eminent pathway in Australia, providing training in both the thoroughbred racehorse breeding and racing sectors, giving participants a holistic view into one of Australia's largest industries.

### NO KIDDING! GOATS DEPLOYED AS HAZARD REDUCTION GRAZING TRIAL UNDERWAY

You heard right – the NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) have recruited goats to undertake a Hazard Reduction grazing trial to evaluate its effectiveness and to continue important mitigation works to further prepare this fire season.

The honorary firefighters have been sourced from local farmers – Dry Creek Farm – who are leasing the goats to the NSW RFS to graze an area in fire-prone areas across the state's west. The goats are expected to help reduce the fuel load in the key high-risk areas, including Clandulla and Lue, with similar hazard reduction grazing trials being undertaken in Werris Creek and across the Far South Coast. NSW RFS Inspector Troy Gersback said the grazing trial arose in response to the NSW Government inquiry into the 2019/2020 fire season.

"The NSW RFS is continuing to explore a range of other hazard reduction techniques to better understand the effectiveness of different practices in various circumstances, this includes grazing," Inspector Gersback said. "The NSW RFS is always keen to learn more about how we can improve and enhance the ways we can better prepare areas ahead of fire season. "These goats provide an alternative to burning which is heavily reliant on favourable weather. The four legged firefighting crews will be reducing the fuel loads rain, hail or shine."

Identification of the hazard reduction grazing sites have been done in consultation with local NSW

- 1. TRIM overhanging trees and shrubs.
- 2. **MOW** grass and remove the cuttings. Have a cleared area around your home.
- 3. **REMOVE** material that can burn around your home (e.g. Door mats, wood piles, mulch)
- 4. **CLEAR** and remove all the debris and leaves from the gutters surrounding your home.
- 5. **PREPARE** a sturdy hose or hoses that will reach all around your home.

I was out at Dixons Long Point between Mudgee and Orange recently to walk and inspect a section of the route that has been revised to address cultural heritage issues. Representatives of local Indigenous groups had previously raised concerns about some parts of the proposed route. As a result, a section of the project was revised.

I joined representatives of the Wellington Valley Wiradjuri Aboriginal Corporation, the Murong Gialinga Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Corporation and the Orange Local Aboriginal Land Council to walk the new route. I'd like to thank all involved for their very positive engagement and for teaching me so much about the Indigenous history of the area. There is now consensus that the new route is more appropriate.

I would also like to thank the Mid-Western Regional Council and Ray Kearns for the tremendous amount of work they have done on the project to date. Special thanks also to landholder Mark for being so welcoming. It is much appreciated.

We will now proceed with getting the necessary approvals so that we can put a drilling rig on site to do geo-tech work, ahead of putting a contract in place.

The Australian Government has committed \$29.8 million towards this project of strategic importance. It will have far reaching implications in terms of tourism, jobs and economic productivity. The whole Central West region will benefit for many generations to come.
