Your commonly asked legal questions answered

I am recently separated from my partner and in the process of getting a divorce. Is it necessary for me to review my Will at this stage?

When you separate from your partner, but are not yet divorced, your domestic status does not affect your Will. So, if you no longer wish to leave your assets and belongings to your ex-partner, then the answer is YES, you should change your Will and, if applicable, revoke the Power of Attorney that you may have put in place as your former partner.

If you don't change your Will, and you pass away before you are divorced, your ex-partner will stay the beneficiary of those assets. Additionally, if they were named as the Executor, they would retain this role.

We would therefore recommend that it is wise to review your estate plan if you are recently separated.

Notes from the Editor


Welcome to the 12th edition of the Mid-Western Mail and our first publication for 2022.

JUST LANDED



What's happening in the wonderful world of Birds and Wildlife in our region!

An AUSTRALIAN PELICAN spotted at Putta Bucca Wetlands is an uncommon sight in inland Australia. However, the wet season we are having allows Pelicans to take the opportunity to extend their feeding and breeding grounds further inland.

The bill is sensitive, and this helps locate fish in murky water. When fully extended, the bill can hold up to 13 litres! Breeding depends on environmental conditions, particularly rainfall, and begins with courtship. The female leads potential mates around the colony. The males threaten each other while swinging their open bills to attract the female's attention. Both sexes perform "pouch-rippling" in which they clap their bills shut several times a second, and the pouch ripples like a flag in a strong breeze.

WHITE-WINGED CHOUGHS usually occur in flocks of up to 20 birds, though sometimes many more may congregate during the non-breeding season. Flocks are composed of breeding adults and non-breeding helpers and some young from earlier broods. When the chicks first leave the nest, they cannot fly and are easy prey for feral cats and foxes. The young birds can fly as strongly as their parents after another 28 days. Parties of Choughs are known to kidnap young birds from neighbouring groups. White-winged Choughs are found in open forests and woodlands. They tend to prefer the wetter areas, with lots of leaf litter, for feeding and available mud for nest building.

GOANNAS have been sighted as the weather heats up. They radiated from the north to Africa and Australia during the Miocene epoch, around 15 million years ago and have an important place in our history and culture. They were an important traditional native food source and are commonly represented in Aboriginal Dreamtime stories.

While they may appear slow, goannas are fast runners and will sprint short distances on their hind legs – often to the safety of water or a tree. Goannas eat just about anything they can catch and swallow whole. Prey is dependent on size but includes insects, birds, eggs, small reptiles and mammals. You will often spot them hunting in trees, but they nest and sleep underground in burrows that they dig with their sharp claws.

How adorable is this little EASTERN STONE GECKO found at the Gulgong Pioneers Museum, hiding under one of the machinery exhibits! The Stone Gecko is widespread in Arid parts of Australia and is nocturnal, finding shelter in depressions in the earth under rocks

and logs during the day and feeding on insects during the night. They can display distinct zig-zag markings and have a cone-shaped tail used for balance, fat storage and camouflage. When threatened by one of its many predators, they will open their mouth and balance on their hind legs to appear more intimidating, with the ability to drop their tails as a last resort. Like many geckos, the Stone Gecko





has no eyelids and uses its fleshy tongue to keep its pupils from drying out.

150th YEAR ANNIVERSARY 1872 - 2022

It was in the winter of 1872 that Henry Beaufoy Merlin and Charles Bayliss arrived in Gulgong to take photographs of the booming gold rush. This year we celebrate the 150th year of their arrival and the beginning of Gulgong's association with their wonderful photographic history and the Holtermann Collection.

The Gulgong Holtermann Museum plans to celebrate this 150th Anniversary by sharing their new, free Interactive Street Trail in February, normally only free to all paying visitors, with those wishing to simply explore our quaint Gulgong streetscapes. The Trail will take you to some of Merlin's photographic locations in Gulgong. It also provides you with a selection of original 1872 photographs and audio and text descriptions taken from newspaper articles to support the selected photographs. Visitors can start and finish the Trail to suit themselves and will require acceptance of our Terms and Conditions to proceed.

So, if you have a smart phone and can set up the GPS settings on your device without assistance, all you



need to do is scan the Interactive Street Trail QR code on the A-Frame board located outside the Gulgong Holtermann Museum and then enter the daily access code to start the free Trail. This Trail may encourage some to return to the Gulgong Holtermann Museum



to experience the UNESCO listed Holtermann Collection photographs housed within our two State Heritage listed buildings. The unique contemporary environment is dotted throughout with interactive touchscreens which include photographs of Victoria, Sydney, Gulgong and surrounding regional towns taken in the 1870's.

If you are interested in gold rush history, photography, the wet plate Collodion process, or simply love Gulgong history, then this Museum should be on the top of your Gulgong 'to do' list.

Look out for this month's sale item, the official Gulgong Holtermann Museum Booklet, Lens on the Goldfield. This booklet is a unique way to take home a special slice of our Gulgong History.

PHOTOGRAPHS BY LINDA JACKSON AO, AT MUDGEE ARTS PRECINCT

Titled Linda Jackson: Retreat, Regeneration, Reflection, the exhibition documents a year of photography after the 2019/2020 Black Summer Bushfires that burnt through Jackson's Clandulla property.

Renowned in Australian art and design industries, Jackson is best known for her long-term partnership with Jenny Kee. The pair were trailblazers in the 1970s and 1980s with their iconic use of Australiana in their fashion and designs. Their partnership was recently honoured with a survey exhibition Stepping Into Paradise at the Powerhouse Museum and a documentary detailing their long-time creative career and friendship.

Born in 1950, Jackson grew up in Beaumaris, Melbourne surrounded by the bush, stimulating a lifelong fascination with the Australian landscape. She was introduced to photography at this time through her grandfather's darkroom and began experimenting from an early age.

Linda later trained in photography at the Prahran Technical College under cinematographer, Paul Cox. She also forged a close friendship with one of Australia's most renowned female photographers, Carol Jerrems.

This exhibition recounts a year that was difficult for many in our community, particularly those affected by the crippling drought, subsequent bushfires and later COVID lockdowns. During this time, Jackson was able to retreat and capture almost daily photographs to detail the landscape and its gradual and inevitable recovery in the wake of the fires.

This is the first solo exhibition by Linda Jackson of her photographs. Mudgee Arts Precinct is open seven days a week from 9am to 5pm. Entry is free.

THE YEAR OF THE TIGER

2022 Chinese New Year will fall on 2 February.

The Chinese calendar is quite different from the Western calendar. It is based on the movements of the moon. Each month is measured by the way the moon appears to grow bigger and smaller. One month measures one whole cycle of the moon. The New Year begins with the new moon. This happens on a different date each year but is usually sometime in late January or early February.

As in the Western calendar, there are 12 months in the year, but there are also 12 years in the Chinese calendar cycle. Each year is named after a different animal and each animal comes around in turn, once every 12 years. Several different stories explain how the 12 animals were chosen for the calendar. The ancient legend is of The Great Race ordered by the Jade Emperor, the King of Heaven.

THE CHARACTERS OF THE 12 ANIMALS

Each of the 12 animals in the Chinese calendar has a different character. And your own character depends on which animal was ruling in the year you were born: "This is the animal that hides in your heart".

Find the year you were born in and discover your own animal sign:

RAT: 1936, 1948, 1960, 1972, 1984, 1996, 2008, 2020 **Rats are clever, ambitious and quick-witted.** They get along well with Dragons and Monkeys.

OX: 1937, 1949, 1961, 1973, 1985, 1997, 2009, 2021 **Oxen are honest, patient and hardworking.** They get along well with Snakes and Cockerels.

TIGER: 1938, 1950, 1962, 1974, 1986, 1998, 2010, 2022

Tigers are brave, powerful and daring. They get along well with Horses and Dogs.

HARE: 1939, 1951, 1963, 1975, 1987, 1999, 2011

Hares are lucky, kind and peaceful. They get along well with Sheep and Pigs.

DRAGON: 1940, 1952, 1964, 1976, 1988, 2000, 2012 **Dragons are powerful, strong and energetic.** They get along well with Rats and Monkeys.

SNAKE: 1941, 1953, 1965, 1977, 1989, 2001, 2013 **Snakes are calm, wise and elegant.** *They get along well*

with Oxen and Cockerels.

HORSE: 1942, 1954, 1966, 1978, 1990, 2002, 2014 **Horses are popular, independent and fun.** They get along well with Tigers and Dogs.

SHEEP: 1943, 1955, 1967, 1979, 1991, 2003, 2015

Sheep are artistic, loving and tender-hearted. They get along well with Hares and Pigs.

MONKEY: 1944, 1956, 1968, 1980, 1992, 2004, 2016 Monkeys are happy, confident and enthusiastic. They get along well with Dragons and Rats.

COCKEREL: 1945, 1957, 1969, 1981, 1993, 2005, 2017 Cockerels are adventurous, kind and hardworking.

They get along well with Snakes and Oxen. **DOG:** 1946, 1958, 1970, 1982, 1994, 2006, 2018

Dogs are loyal, affectionate and generous. They get along well with Tigers and Horses.

PIG: 1947, 1959, 1971, 1983, 1995, 2007, 2019

WHAT TO DO IF YOU HAVE COVID-19



IMPORTANT If you have COVID-19, you must self isolate until medically cleared, even if you are fully vaccinated.

You are not allowed to leave your home except for urgent medical care or in an emergency (including to avoid injury or escape risk of harm from domestic violence).

Self isolation means you cannot:

- Go to work or school
- Go to any public places (e.g. shops, parks, beaches)
- Have any visitors in your home, unless they are providing healthcare, emergency maintenance or emergency services
- Use public transport

You are only allowed to leave your home or accommodation to get a COVID-19 test, for urgent medical care or in an emergency (including to avoid injury or escape the risk of harm from domestic violence).

What to do if you test positive for COVID-19

- ✓ Self isolate
- Tell your household
- Tell your employer and/or educational facility
- Tell other close contacts
- Wait until you receive medical clearance

SELFISOLATION

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND CARERS

WHAT IF THE PERSON I CARE FOR IS A CLOSE CONTACT AND CANNOT **SELF-ISOLATE ON THEIR OWN?**

What to do:

- You must not attend high-risk settings during the close contact's isolation period.
- This includes health care, aged care, disability care, early childhood centres, primary school and correctional facilities.
- If other members of your household cannot self-isolate away fromyou or the person who is a
- close contact you will all need to follow the advice above regardless of individual vaccination status.
- You should keep the person who is the close contact away from the rest of your household as much as you can.

This advice also applies when a parent or carer is the close contact and is unable to self-isolate away from the person they care for in the household.

SELFISOLATION

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A CLOSE CONTACT OF SOMEONE WITH COVID-19

If you have been identified as a **close contact** you must self isolate until medically cleared, even if you are fully vaccinated and or you have previously recovered from COVID-19. Please follow the below advice.

What to do:

- Self isolate for 7 days
- Get tested as soon as your find out you are a close contact.
- Test again on day 6
- If your tests are negative you can leave self isolation after 7 days
- Limit activity for the next 7 days.

This means you must work from home where possible and not go to high risk settings (health care, aged care, disability care, early childhood centres, primary school and correctional facilities)

Get tested again on day 12

If you live with a COVID-19 positive person and have not been isolating from them, you should only leave self-isolation after 14 days if your test from day 12 is negative, you feel well and have had no further contact with any COVID-19 positive persons.



In December of 2017 my husband and I had recently relocated from Kingston in Tasmania to the mainland to live, to Mudgee in fact. I have been a member of Red Hatters for years, in whatever State we had lived in, so after settling in I then looked to find a local Red Hat Chapter to join. And found there wasn't one. So I decided to find other ladies who would be interested in becoming members.

You have probably seen us around, we wear purple on our shoulders and a Red Hat with lots of bling, younger ladies, fondly referred to as "Pinkies" wear lavender with pink hats and graduate to wearing Red and Purple upon reaching the magic birthday of 50.

Each Chapter structures itself according to wishes and whims of its members. In four years The Merry Mamzelles has grown to seventeen ladies, we are a very diverse group, our individual interests cover a wide range as do our titles, of which the first part of the title can be a Royal title but the second part of the title refers to a particular interest or hobby .We currently have a "Countess Serendipity" who is also our Vice-Queen, "Baroness Bossy Boots", a "Duchess of Down Sizing", "Lady Cut & Chat a Lot", "Princess Cind A Lot", "Baroness Bargain Hunter", "Contessa of Butterflies & Gemstones" and "Lady Sew & Sew" to name just a few.

We now have ladies from Rylstone, Kandos, Gulgong as well as Mudgee and each Red Hatter suggests 4 venues she would like to visit, then our yearly program is drawn up from those suggestions. Not only do we celebrate monthly birthdays, those Red Hatters whose birthdays fall during the month, reverse their colours i.e. they wear a purple hat and red on their shoulders we also have special months, during March,

CWA CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

The CWA of NSW had its beginnings at the Bushwomen's Conference held in conjunction with the Royal Agricultural Show in Sydney in April 1922. The conference was initiated by Dr Richard Arthur, MP for North Sydney, and Miss Florence Gordon, who ran the Home Page of the Stock and Station Journal.



Mr Arthur had been calling for the need to improve conditions for rural women and Miss Gordon had published a plan for a 'Country Women's Union of Help' in 1921, partly inspired by the Women's Institutes in Canada and Britain. At the conference, on 20 April 1922, an organising committee was formed, including Miss Gordon and Mrs Grace Munro, of Bingara, who was to become the CWA of NSW's foundation president.

The CWA was focused on fighting isolation and a lack of health facilities, members immediately starting work on setting up baby health care centres, funding more bush nurses, and building and staffing the likes of maternity wards, hospitals, schools, rest homes, and holiday getaways for rural and remote families.

"These women were initiators, fighters and lobbyists, who were passionate about making rural and regional NSW better for those who lived there. For 100 years the members of the CWA of NSW have continued the legacy of those trail-blazing foundation members by improving the social, educational, recreational and medical realities for their communities," said Stephanie Stanhope, CWA of NSW President.

"This year is such an exciting one for all of us and we're so proud that the Association formed all those decades ago has grown to be the largest women's organisation in Australia and continues to positively contribute to rural and regional communities in so many different ways."

In the 100 years the CWA of NSW has been in existence, members have helped bring about some major changes across the state. From the earliest days of the Association, members were tireless in their efforts to establish more hospitals, maternity wards and baby health centres in country centres. Even during the Depression, when members themselves were struggling to feed and clothe their families, the CWA of NSW continued to lobby for better health facilities in the bush, and were successful in many cases. The Association went onto play an important advocacy role in the introduction of compulsory seat belts, white lines on the edge of roads and flashing speed signs in school zones.

The Kandos, Ilford/Running Stream and Rylstone branches of Country Women's Association are holding an International Women's Day event on 8 March 2022 as part of our centenary celebrations.

Our guest speaker will be **Jane Caro AM** who is a feminist social commentator, writer and lecturer. Other presenters will be in attendance on the day.

The event will be held on **Tuesday 8th March 2022** at Kandos Memorial Hall at 11am.



2021 was certainly another interesting year for the club with COVID-19 throwing a few spanners in the works, as it has done for everyone. Classes were suspended for a period, and we were unable to go ahead with our annual weekend of shows/trials in August. Hopefully this year will be better.

Whilst it's been a bit too warm to be running training classes over the hottest part of summer, we're nearly ready to get stuck back into it! We'll be at Victoria Park in Gulgong on Sundays from 20th February and newcomers are welcome to join us for the 10am class. We will be there every Sunday, except for public holiday weekends.

All classes are only \$2 each and we just need to sight the dog's current vaccination certificate on your first visit. If you'd like to continue classes, you'll then need to become a member. Annual membership fees start at \$4 for a pensioner and vary, up to \$17 for a family.

The club is there to help everyone with their furry buddies. You may simply want to socialise your dog around other dogs, want to improve some basic manners, or you may even be thinking about competing in dog shows or dog sports. Our classes are aimed at helping everyone.

Often we're asked how old a puppy needs to be before joining our classes. The most important factor is safety.

While your puppy is still having it's vaccinations it is a good idea to enrol your puppy at puppy school with one of the local vets, where all the puppies attending will be at a similar stage of vaccination. Generally the first vaccination is arranged by the breeder at 6-8 weeks of age, then the second vaccination is arranged by the new owner at 10-12 weeks and a third vaccination at 14-16 weeks. Following the recommended quarantine period after the third vaccination, as stated on the vaccination certificate, your puppy will then be ready to attend our classes.

SMART WATER METER PORTAL 'YOURWATER' LIVE

Residents can now monitor their water usage in real time with the launch of Council's new Smart Water Meter portal, YourWater.

Along with real time data on the amount of water being used each day, customers can receive and pay water bills and set up email and SMS alerts to notify them of possible water leaks and high consumption periods.

To register for YourWater visit yourwater.midwestern. nsw.gov.au.

Customers will be prompted to provide some personal details and information on their latest Water Notice. The site includes 'how-to' videos on the sign up process as a property owner and tenant, understanding the dashboard, as well as leak identification and management.

"Smart Water Meters have been installed throughout the region and these constantly relay data to the online portal, YourWater, where owners, tenants and property managers can monitor their water consumption, water bills, and receive custom water leak alerts to assist with high usage and leak detection," Council's General Manager, Brad Cam said.

Installation of Smart Water Meters began in 2019 after Council secured \$1.2m through the Australian Government's Smart Cities and Suburbs Program. The Smart Water Meter Network will provide an estimated \$445,000 annual cost saving to ratepayers by detecting leakages in real time. In 2015/16, 140 million litres of water was lost due to leakages. The new meters will relay data on an hourly basis to Council, allowing Council's Water Team to act promptly.


