MAJOR EVENTS GENERATE \$3.6 MILLION ECONOMIC BENEFIT

More than \$3.6 million has been injected into the local economy as a direct result of the three major events at Glen Willow this year.

A combined 18,228 people made it through the gates to see the NRL Charity Shield: South Sydney Rabbitohs v St George Illawarra Dragons (26 February), Round 4: Manly Warringah Sea Eagles v Canberra Raiders (2 April), and A-League Round 19: Central Coast Mariners v Macarthur FC (26 March). Economic data shows 67 per cent of Manly v Canberra event attendees were visitors to the region, while 54 per cent of A-League attendees and 66 per cent of Charity Shield attendees were visitors to the region.

Visitors spend in local businesses, they eat in local restaurants and cafes, stay in local motels, and shop. The flow on economic benefits of major events are among the reasons why Council works to partner with professional sports clubs to secure multi-year games.

Based on these visitor numbers Council estimates the Manly v Canberra game generated \$1.4 million for the local economy, whilst A-League generated \$400,000 and Charity Shield \$1.8 million. Of the Manly game attendees 90 per cent plan to return to Mudgee again as a visitor, more than 80 per cent visited a local hospitality venue during their stay in the region, more than 70 per cent of overnight visitors stayed in hotels, motels, caravan parks and home rentals/Airbnbs.

Feedback on these events has been overwhelmingly



positive, with comments like: "Great long weekend. Mudgee really made an effort to welcome NRL supporters and the game itself was at a fantastic venue. The town has many cafes, pubs and restaurants and is very beautiful", "Excellent region with plenty to do while in the area plus a great ground", "Enjoyed the games immensely... our first visit to Mudgee and we're highly impressed", and "Was a good set out event with quality food and drinks with easy access to multiple options if one was busy. Sold me with the amazing stadium with the sun really shining as it went down over the mountains before the game started."

Council will host the Charity Shield again in 2023 with a date to be announced later this year.

- The Gondolf Bible and a selection of papers from the Burke/Rumsey Collection will be on permanent display from Saturday, 11th June.
- We are also pleased to present our temporary exhibitions, the Christopher Dingle Transition Photographs and a selection of Adrian Cook glass and Tintype plates. Christopher Dingle's photographs show the same Gulgong scenes 150 years apart and Adrian Cook's plates are a modern interpretation of Henry Beaufoy Merlin's work. The temporary exhibitions will be on display until the end of September.



NOT ALL NATIONAL PARKS ARE EQUAL

There are more than 900 national parks and reserves in NSW - that's over 7 million hectares - and more than 9 percent of the land area of NSW. The NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) part of the Environment and Heritage Group in the Department of Planning and Environment manages all of them. These areas cover a range of habitats, from rainforests and rugged bush to coastal landscapes and outback deserts. But did you know that not all national parks are created equal?

Some of these protected areas can cope fairly easily with different types of human activities. Others are more fragile, and need a higher level of protection. This is one of the reasons there are different categories of protected areas. For example: Nature Reserves, National Parks, Regional Parks and Sate Conservation Areas (SCAs). But just how much protection is provided to SCAs? These 146 significant reserves are protected at ground level only!



According to NPWS: 'State Conservation Areas (SCAs) are lands reserved to protect and conserve significant or representative ecosystems, landforms, natural phenomena or places of cultural significance. They provide opportunities for sustainable visitation, public enjoyment, and research.

The main difference between the management, objectives and principles of national parks and state conservation areas is that mineral and petroleum exploration and mining may be permitted in state conservation areas.'

This means SCAs are at risk of impact from exploration and mining activities. Negative impacts would easily include, noise, dust, loss of groundwater, loss of surface water, and subsidence, as a minimum. All of which would greatly reduce the values that caused the SCA to be reserved in the first place. Surely there is contradiction here? If we wish to 'protect and conserve significant or representative ecosystems, landforms, natural phenomena or places of cultural significance' then that protection must be absolute.

SCAs are reviewed every 5 years to assess whether there is still a need for the two uses. Why not check your favourite SCA, join your local environment group and lobby to fully protect these precious reserves.

LUE PUBLIC SCHOOL



On Wednesday 11th May, students in year 3 to 6 travelled to Crookwell for an Agricultural camping experience.

Despite constant rain, they had a fabulous time joining in sheep shearing, (carefully analysing the fleeces), listening to Aboriginal stories and contributing to an artwork with Aboriginal elders from Goulburn AECG, learning about lunar planting and joining in a walk discussing the importance of native pastures to future farming.

Students and staff camped in yurts and experienced a real campfire dinner with freshly baked damper.

The event was organised by Jo Marshall at the Australian Agricultural Centre in Crookwell and is part of a pilot program to educate our next generation of farmers and Landcare specialists. It was a wonderful experience for our students and they came back to school eagerly discussing how they could embrace the idea of lunar planting with our veggie garden later this year. My thanks to Jo and her band of volunteers for their hospitality.

At Lue Public School, we continually search for opportunities and life experiences for our students and look forward to doing this one again in the future.

ABOUT THE AUSTRALIAN AGRICULTURAL CENTRE, CROOKWELL by Jo Marshall

Our education and demonstration centre the Australian Agricultural Centre in Crookwell was set up to encourage the next generation of agriculturalists. However, when COVID arrived it made me change my focus on what we could deliver without the physical infrastructure. In 2020 we ran STEMConnect which was a virtual campus as we were all learning from home. 2021 we looked at what we already had on site at the Australian Agricultural Centre, a shearing

shed, a hay shed and paddocks, and a great sky. We looked at the curriculum and brought together something that we thought would be relaxed and engaging for the students who haven't been allowed on excursions for a couple of years.

We are classified as a primitive camp so overnight was all we could manage, and we wanted the urban based students to see what rural people get to enjoy every day, the space and the sky. I had seen in the Women's Weekly the lunar guide since I was young and thought, let's work with the local school and the community garden and conduct an experiment. So, the agricultural content was started, we also wanted to look at topical issues such as drought and how native pastures and exotic pastures compare.

Lastly being out under the sky around the campfire I thought would be good for all of us with the effects of the pandemic. So some mindfulness activities and education would be terrific while learning a little about Australian Aboriginal heritage, some children nearly fell asleep around the fire. It was just an organic approach to get something going with people I knew would be great for our first program.

Since starting with what we have there has been amazing momentum and hopefully we can now source some larger funding for better amenities.

LANDHOLDERS URGED TO NOTIFY AND FOLLOW RULES OF SAFE BURNING

Residents and landholders are reminded of the need to notify fire agencies before lighting hazard reductions and pile burns now that the statutory Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) has come to a close in NSW.

An online portal provides NSW residents the ability to quickly and easily notify fire services when they're planning to use fire on their property. Using their mobile phone or desktop computer, residents and landholders can lodge their notification of a planned hazard reduction or burn off 24 hours a day, 7 days a week via the RFS portal.

NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) Superintendent Troy Porter said that by notifying their neighbours and using the online tool at www.rfs.nsw. gov.au/notify users can help prevent unnecessary emergency calls.

"Over coming months many landholders may take the opportunity to burn off – but it's important they do it safely and let us and their neighbours know.

"While the official BFDP has concluded, landholders still need to make sure they've obtained any required permits and permissions, as well as notifying neighbours and fire authorities 24 hours before lighting up. The online tool makes it easier to notify the NSW RFS before conducting your burn.

"If fire services know about a planned burn, it can help prevent unnecessary responses from local firefighters when we know it is planned and controlled. By using the online notification tool, landholders will also be notified of any Total Fire Bans or restrictions and if so, will be advised to not proceed with their burn. NSW RFS Superintendent Porter said while landholders are encouraged to reduce fuel loads on their property, it is imperative that it is done so safely and legally.

"Before lighting any fire you need to have adequately prepared fire breaks and have firefighting



equipment on hand to ensure the fire does not escape.

"Every landholder has a responsibility to prevent fire spreading from their property and there can be serious consequences for people who light fires and leave them unattended," Superintendent Porter said.

To notify of your intent to burn off, use the online burn notification tool at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify.
Landholders can still notify the NSW RFS by contacting their local Fire Control Centre.
