It being the centenary of NSW CWA and the 10th anniversary of Global International Women's Day, the local CWAs (Kandos, Rylstone and Ilford/Running Stream) are holding an International Women's Day luncheon on 8th March at Kandos Community Hall at 11am. KANDOS RYLSTONE FILM SOCIETY

The Kandos Rylstone Film Society, run by volunteers and an initiative of Kandos CWA, holds monthly films at Rylstone Hall on the second Saturday of each month. Last year the society showed eleven films, despite the impact of COVID. This popular community attraction is possible through a generous grant from Mid-Western Regional Council.

Annual membership of the society can be purchased on film nights for a mere \$15 single and \$30 family, which gives entry to all films. 2021 membership continues into 2022.

ST PATRICKS DAY

St Patrick's Day is officially observed on March 17 each year, though celebrations may not be limited to this date. The significance of March 17 is that it's said to be the date of St Patrick's death in the late 5th century (circa AD 493). St Patrick is one of Ireland's patron saints.

While not a public holiday, Saint Patrick's Day is observed in Australia with festivities and events across the country – particularly in pubs and bars and other night venues, since most years the celebrations take place on a week day after work.

The Irish were among the first Europeans to settle in Australia. They comprised a portion of the convict settlement population in the late 1700s but more than 300,000 other Irish settlers migrated to Australia between 1840 and 1914. Many came to Australia to escape famine in their homeland. About 30 percent of Australians are believed to have some Irish ancestry today.

Celebrating St Patrick's Day is one way of preserving Irish traditions and customs in Australia. St Patrick worked as a missionary in Ireland. It is believed that he banished "snakes" from the country although the term "snakes" may have referred to druids or pagan worshippers.

Many people wear the colour green on St Patrick's Day. They may also wear a symbol of Ireland, such as a shamrock or a harp. Images of leprechauns, a pot of gold and the Irish flag colours (green, white and orange) are also visible during events and activities on the day.

In Ireland's flag, the green represents the Catholics, orange represents the Protestants and white represents the "peace" between the groups.



4 Surprising Facts About St. Patrick's Day

- Saint Patrick was not Irish! He was from Wales. He is remembered for bringing Christianity to Ireland.
- Although it is believed that Saint Patrick drove all the snakes out of Ireland, snakes have never been native to Ireland!
- The Shamrock was considered a sacred plant which represents the Holy Trinity. The shamrock is Ireland's national flower and it is one of the main symbols of Saint Patrick's Day.
- Leprechauns are likely based on Celtic fairies. If you catch one they are forced to tell you where their pot of gold is!

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

On Tuesday the 15th March, Watershed Landcare, in collaboration with local mentor Col Seis will be hosting a workshop in Gulgong to demonstrate the advantages of Adaptive Planned Grazing. Graziers and farmers are invited to attend this FREE, interactive day where we'll hear from experienced trainers and mentors and see the results of this practical grazing technique.

What is Adaptive Planned Grazing (APG)?

APG is a tool. It is helpful in good times and during drought. Land managers who use APG effectively can quickly respond to climate, rainfall, and economic factors, providing opportunities to make the most of high/low livestock prices and adjust the stock density to make the most of available feed.

Put simply, APG involves high stock densities and a high rotation frequency. Ideally, you would have all your stock in one mob, rotating every day or two through smaller paddocks to get increased ground disturbance, the concentration of manure, and optimum feed utilisation. Paddocks are then left to rest and recover for an extended period before being grazed again. This technique mimics how wild herd animals graze, stimulates more diverse plant species, and builds soil health and structure.

The yellow and browns of a hot summer are not happening, it's just green. Returning visitors will notice new shops.





What's happening in the wonderful world of Birds and Wildlife in our region?

TAWNY FROGMOUTH

When a roosting Tawny
Frogmouth is discovered,
it usually adopts a cryptic
posture which makes it
resemble a broken-off branch:
it perches stiffly, sleeking its
plumage and orientating its
tail along the branch, and
narrowing its eyes to slits. In
addition, its plumage, a blend
of spots, blotches and streaks



of grey, brown, black and tawny, blends in almost perfectly with its surroundings. However, when not roosting in disguise, frogmouths are much easier to spot at night.

The Tawny Frogmouth is found throughout Australia, including Tasmania and can be found in various habitats except for the denser rainforests and treeless deserts. The bulk of the Tawny Frogmouth's diet comprises nocturnal insects, worms, slugs and snails. Small mammals, reptiles, frogs and birds are also eaten. Most food is obtained by pouncing to the ground from a tree or other elevated perch. Tawny Frogmouths have a regular breeding season, but birds in more arid areas may breed in response to heavy rains.

PEACEFUL DOVE

The Peaceful Dove is a small dove with striking black and white barring on its chest, leading some to nickname it the Zebra Dove. They can be found near water, especially in



open woodlands, and can often be heard from great distances gently doodle-dooing from a high exposed branch. You will often see Peaceful Doves in pairs or small family groups on the ground where they forage for small grass and sedge seeds. Peaceful Doves need to drink at least twice a day, so they never stray far from water.

RAINBOW BEE EATER

A striking, colourful bird, the Rainbow Bee-Eater is a spectacular sight! They are familiar with many woodland parts of mainland Australia. They are fantastic aerial hunters, swiftly darting



after insects, sometimes with dramatic twists and turns. Rainbow Bee-Eaters (as the name suggests) mainly feed on bees and wasps; they will also snack on dragonflies, butterflies and other flying insects. The clever birds have developed a technique for disarming painful stings. The Bee-Eater will carry their prey to a branch where they will rub and beat the bee/wasp against the perch, removing the sting. These bold characters will gather in small flocks to travel between Summer breeding areas and Winter feeding habitats. When they are ready to breed, the females choose a nesting site in sandy soil and dig a tunnel and nesting chamber where both parents will incubate and feed the young chicks, sometimes with the assistance of auxiliaries (helpers).

NEIGHBOUR DAY 2022

Neighbour Day was founded in Melbourne, Australia in March 2003 by Andrew Heslop after the remains of an elderly woman were found inside her suburban home. Mrs Elsie Brown had been dead for two years – forgotten by her neighbours, her friends and her family. While Andrew did not know Mrs Brown he was shocked by the apparent ease with which the world had left her behind.

Widespread media interest followed and it was this coverage that prompted Andrew to suggest a 'National Check on Your Neighbour Day' in a Letter to the Editor of *The Melbourne Age* in 2003.

Andrew was inspired by his late grandparents and his own neighbour – 83 year old Clive Tayler of Albert Park. An active resident in the street, Clive mowed the nature strips of his neighbours, picked up the rubbish and recycling bins on Monday mornings, mended loose gates and took care of the odd jobs which needed to be done. Always good-humoured, gentle and kind, Clive was never intrusive – proving you can be a great neighbour without actually becoming intimately involved in other people's lives.

Andrew's concept was refined, renamed and on Sunday 30th March 2003 the first Neighbour Day was observed. Since 2003, Neighbour Day has progressed from a reminder to connect with elderly neighbours to an annual celebration of strong communities and friendly streets. People of all ages participate because everyone everywhere is a neighbour no matter where you live nor your personal circumstances.

Relationships Australia has been the home of Neighbour Day since January 2014. 2022 marks the 20th Anniversary of Neighbour Day.

Players are eligible and able to access their \$100 voucher from the 1st January 2022 and 1 July 2022. Each voucher can only be used once per child (K-12) per year but can be used for any sport or activity that is registered with NSW Active Kids.

Through the Rugby Xplorer App you will be able to use your Active Kids voucher to reduce the cost of registration at the time of payment. If you do not enter your voucher at the time of registration, there is no retrospective use of voucher.

INTERNATIONAL DOWN SYNDROME AWARENESS DAY

March is a significant month for Pearl & Adam Swords and their family as March 21st is International Down Syndrome Awareness Day. It's a time to appreciate the everyday achievements of their son Charlie who has Down Syndrome.

Tell us about Charlie.

Charlie turned six on January 4th (a birthday he shares with his Nanna Kay in Ireland!) and has started Kindy at St Matthew's Catholic School.

He has a great sense of humour, loves books, enjoys going to the park, animals, movies and music. He currently loves The Imagine Dragons, Queen and Ed Sheeran to name a few. He adores babies and his warmheart generally leaves a good impression on both young and old. He idolises his older brother Rian (8) and loves to do everything that Rian does from playing soccer to backyard cricket – he gives everything a go! The connection he has with his Nannie and Poppy Swords is also phenomenal. Our decision to relocate from Sydney to Mudgee when Charlie was 10 months old has been a great one for our family.

Tell us about Down syndrome?

Down syndrome is the most commonly occurring genetic condition. It's estimated that approximately 1 in every 1,100 births annually in Australia should eventuate in a child with Down syndrome. However, the pressure to terminate such pregnancies, as Pearl and Adam also experienced, is so great that the numbers presenting with Down syndrome are sadly much lower. The condition got its name from Dr Langdon Down who first researched it. Ordinarily, a baby is born with 46 chromosomes. However, babies with Down syndrome have an extra copy of chromosome number 21 hence the name Trisomy 21 (or T21). That's why the 21st day of the 3rd month is International Down Syndrome Awareness Day.

What does having that extra chromosome-21 mean?

It typically associates with delays in terms of hitting development milestones and with reduced cognitive ability. A few of the distinguishing physical features are almond shaped eyes, a small nose and typically a shorter stature.

What is the best language to use when talking about Down syndrome?

The term "a Down's child" or a "Downs" is often used. A better phrase is 'a child or adult with Down Syndrome' – Charlie is a Swords' child!

People with Down syndrome don't 'suffer' from it they merely have the condition.

People say "Charlie is just like a 'normal' child" which, although well-intended, indirectly classifies him as 'abnormal'. We often volunteer that relative to typical kids, he stacks up pretty well!

We used to describe Charlie as "our son with special needs" until a teacher corrected us. It was pointed out that while he may require additional supports to

meet his needs, those needs are exactly the same as everyone's and that they aren't in fact special needs - they're human needs.

What are some myths about Down syndrome?

It is not possible to have 'mild' or 'severe' Down Syndrome. A person either does or doesn't have it. An individual's ability is not dependent on the condition but rather on the unique individual.

It is a myth that children with Down syndrome are only born to older parents. While prevalence does increase with the mother's age, around 80% are gifted to women younger than 35. A number of Mums in the T21-community are in their 20s.

It is a myth that people with Down syndrome cannot learn to read and write. Historically, people with Down syndrome were institutionalised and education was discouraged. In the past 30 years however, their IQs have increased by over 20 points and the overwhelming majority learn to read and write. Some are graduating from college and more and more are holding down good jobs. In essence, the more we expect the more we will achieve.

It is a myth that people with Down syndrome can't attend mainstream schools. Evidence-based studies show that including children with different abilities in a mainstream classroom also improves the academic and social performance of their typical peers.

We fear the unfamiliar yet the world is a diverse playground. Engaging with people with different abilities in a fun, curious and compassionate way positively impacts the growth of all involved.

Pearl and Adam want to thank you for taking the time to read about Charlie and about Down syndrome. Please feel free to stop them for a chat – by all accounts Charlie will also be only too delighted to engage!



Smile to myself.





DIXONS LONG POINT CROSSING UPDATE

It was a sight to see at Dixons Long Point Crossing between Mudgee and Orange recently, with drilling rigs and highly skilled engineering geologists onsite undertaking preliminary geotechnical testing to pave the way for the \$29.8 million bridge project. I am immensely proud that the Australian Government is realising this project that has been 160+ years in the making!

Generations of local residents have lobbied and fought for this vital bridge, which will deliver tangible economic and tourism benefits when it links the Orange, Cabonne and Mudgee regions and opens up access to the Hunter Valley and Newcastle areas.

The Bathurst-based Macquarie Geotech was onsite for much of January, collecting rock and soil samples from the proposed route for strength assessment, and the potential to reuse material in construction. Once this work is complete, and environmental approvals are granted, a contract will be finalised. We're now only months away from the next milestone in this remarkable project which will be a true engineering feat!

FUNDING FOR NEW ACCOMMODATION CENTRE A BOOST FOR REGION

It's no surprise to see Mudgee's Glen Willow Stadium secure a number of thrilling NRL fixtures each year, with its strong reputation as the gold standard of regional sporting facilities.
