Mudgee has won the major national award of Top Tourism Town for the second year in a row at Australia's Top Tourism Awards 2022.



First up spring, springs eternal, what a picture the Mudgee valley and surrounding areas are right now. Appreciating that more than most are the droves of tourists flocking to the district.

While on the subject of spring, for the second year in a row, Mudgee has been named Australia's Top Tourism Town. It's a gong that should also be shared with partner towns Gulgong, Rylstone and Kandos. This is the tourist industry's Oscar, an exceptional achievement for a population over 5000, in front of the country's major regional cities.

MRT are doing a wonderful creative job promoting the Mid-Western Region, but now the expectations will be greater for what we can improve on. Good service is like finding diamonds and everything that goes with it. Hospitality is a 7-day-a-week industry and tourists expect it to be on song if we want their business and that applies to our attractions. So far, so good. Our region continues to thrive and punch well above its weight.

Congratulations to mates of mine David Swanson and David Sargeant, the men behind award winning extra virgin olive oil Mudgee Harvest, taking out silver at the Sydney Olive Oil Competition. Earlier this year the pair picked up bronze at an international competition in the United States. Mudgee Harvest is really cooking up a storm in the very best kitchens.

Local poet and a very good one at that, Kevin Pye, put together a celebration of the works of Henry Lawson to mark the 100th year of Henry's passing last month. I did



a couple of readings at the Mudgee Town Hall along with other locals. What a gift Henry had with words. His tortured life created masterpieces that endure today. Fittingly his mother Louisa Lawson's statue will soon sit outside the Town Hall, a brilliant project on a formidable woman by Mudgee Rotary.

He's naughty, irreverent, politically incorrect and has run the best local news service in Mudgee for the past 20 years. I'm talking about the Butcher, James O'Neil – the man behind the iconic Butcher Coffee Shop. James and wife Gwenda are moving on as Bali and Melbourne beckon, but the morning ritual with a bunch of larrikins will never be the same again.

The final stages of the Glenn Willow roadway and foot bridge at Putta Bucca will be completed by the end of this year. The bike and pathway will link up for a glorious 8km walk and ride.

Now to a negative. What's the definition of 'Visual Vandalism'? How about a 1.2 kilometre mound of dirt 3 metres high and 25 metres across at the base on the main entrance to Mudgee? That's the latest proposal by the developers of a solar farm at Burrundulla which has already been rejected three times. The dirty mound is supposed to beautify the eyesore but it's an eyesore on top of an eyesore. Two years ago a similar project was rejected on the edge of Gulgong the same should apply to Mudgee. Solar farms are not the problem, just their location. For the sake of \$40,000 a year, this A1 agricultural land can be put to better use and not offend our community or detract from our tourism industry.

In each of these six outstanding gardens you will feel the excitement and delight which are the hallmarks of a special garden. Gardens on display are:

Tamara and Andy Bowman's garden situated at "Bowenfield" at 1788


Castlereagh Highway, Mudgee. This spectacular garden was planned with hedges, trees and an emphasis on the addition of hardy Mediterranean style shrubs. A must see.

The Kempton's graceful garden at 43 Rocky Waterhole Road,
Mudgee is situated on the slopes of Mt Frome and includes a variety of plants chosen to withstand Mudgee's climate. Check the charming pool adorned by irises and bullrushes.

A quarter acre block at **3 Bawden Road, Mudgee** has a secret, the result of 30 years of passion, imagination and hard work by John and Maureen Julius. Suffice to say, you will have never seen a garden like this before. Intrigued? Check it out for yourself.

"Wisteria Ridge" at 1390
Castlereagh Highway, Mudgee is
the home of Col and Val Stubbs
where you will find an array of native
shrubs, a number of species of birds,
Col's marvellous quirky sculptures
and glorious views of the Cudgegong
Valley.

June Middleton's garden at 195 Church Street, Mudgee feels like a secluded, shady forest. An exceptional Chinese Elm, pepper trees and a huge variety of carefully selected drought-tolerant shrubs enhance an expansive lawn and peaceful environment.

Steph and Rick Gordon's 1920's house at "Wilgowrah" 499 Lue Road, Mudgee is a homestead garden which has been many years in the making. A coffee van with homemade goodies and a delicious lunch provided by Mudgee Country Roast will be available at the "Wilgowrah" garden.

2022 marked the 14th year for Watershed Landcare's annual Green Day event! After two years of lockdowns, the environmental education day evolved into much more than just one day of fun for the schools across our region.





Junior Landcare Ambassador, TV Presenter and Gardening Guru, Costa Georgiadis shined the spotlight on the theme "Grow Your Own Way", working towards a more sustainable future, inspiring our kids, schools, educators and the community over three days and five events.

On Thursday, 8th September, 600 kids from 16 local schools gathered to experience an array of workshops and hear from inspiring guest speakers, plus a special session with Costa. The theme of Grow Your Own Way was explored through activities like compost building, native plant identification, gardening, reusing and growing food from scraps, the importance of habitat and biodiversity, and so much more.

The Royal Botanic Gardens donated a Wollemi Pine sapling to each school to commemorate the day.

All the schools that attended on the Thursday were donated a Waterups Square Planter, and Ilford Public School received a larger wicking bed constructed with the school as part of the visit. These donations are a highly appreciated part of Green Day as it allows the schools to take the learning and key messages straight back to school and their classroom.

On Saturday, 10th September, the first ever Green Day for Grown-Ups was launched with great success, with over 70 people in attendance. MUDGEE WINE SHOW AWARDS CAP OFF A FANTASTIC WINE & FOOD MONTH

Not only was the Robert Stein 2019 Dry Riesling named the Champion Wine at the 2022 Mudgee Wine Show but the Robert Stein winemakers also picked up Most Outstanding White Wine of Show for the 2019 Dry Riesling, the Stein Family Trophy for Best Riesling, and the Bob Oatley Trophy for Best Chardonnay for its 2017 Reserve drop.

Winemaker Lisa Bray was dubbed the 2022 Winemaker of the Year, and also took home awards for Most Successful Exhibitor, Most Outstanding Red Wine of Show and Best Cabernet for her 2018 Cabernet Sauvignon, and best Rose of Show for her 2022 LMB Rose.

Other major awards on the night went to Vinifera for best organic/biodynamic/preservative-free wine for its 2021 Organic Reserve Chardonnay, and Petersons' Jamie Hudson and Brendan Foote from 791 Estate, who were named joint Viticulturalist of the Year.

Portrait prizes have a long history in Australia, with the Archibald Prize renowned as much for its ability to accelerate an artist's career as the many controversies it has created over the years.

The Precinct's inaugural Portrait Prize exhibition will take place from 16 December 2022 to 12 March 2023.

Gallery Curator, Lizzy Galloway said the Portrait Prize is open to all artists in all media.

"We're encouraging artists at any level of their artistic practice – from beginners right through to arts professionals – to enter this fantastic new portrait prize," Ms Galloway said.



FUN, INFORMATIVE, A FIRST FOR OUR REGION!

The Gulgong Holtermann Museum is ever growing and we are proud to announce the installation of our additional interactive activities. The children's activities include Holtermann Collection photograph and word puzzles, as well as colourful animated activities. The puzzles and activities will encourage children to engage with the displays and learn about the Gulgong Gold Rush. The activities are included in the Museum entry fee and are designed to engage families and school groups. All children completing four fun activities will receive a "Holtermann Hero" badge.

GOSSIP FROM THE PAST

The Gondolf Bible

You might wonder what a gold bible could have in common with the Holtermann Collection?
Our Research Unit has the goss!

A German immigrant living in Woollahra, Peter Gondolf, purchased the ornate bible with money earned from gold discovered in Hill End. The birth dates of Peter, Johannah and their eight children are hand written on the 'Births' page of the bible. Four of those family members including the

parents and their two oldest children, appear in portraits in the Holtermann Collection.

It is likely that the portraits of Peter and Johannah were taken by Beaufoy Merlin and his assistant Charles Bayliss in their studio at Hill End. While the location is not stated for the Gondolf photos, the floor covering, curtain, tablecloth (reversed) and flower arrangement match those in many other portraits known to be taken in that town. See inset from the portrait of Mr Isaac Augustus Mobbs.

Four-year-old Augustus and baby George Gondolf appear in five of the portraits. This is no mean feat. Children posed a problem for photographers of this era. They needed to be kept still for the long exposure times involved in the wet plate process. Baby George Gondolf is held on the lap of a woman partly hidden by a curtain. You can see the outline of her body and her light-coloured skirt is not fully concealed. In some of the photos of Augustus there is evidence of a neck restraint, designed to keep the child at the correct focal distance from the camera. Check out the photographs of Augustus and the Gondolf family on the Museum touch screens.



BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS

In celebration of World Animal Day on Tuesday 4th October, St Luke's Anglican Church, Gulgong will be hosting a 'Blessing of the Animals' on Sunday 9th October at 9am.

World Animal Day was started in 1931 at a convention of ecologists in Florence as a way of highlighting the plight of endangered species. SAVE YOUR ELM TREES

The elm leaf beetle has arrived in the Mudgee Region! They actually landed in Melbourne about 15 years ago and have been on the slow march north arriving in the Mudgee region about six years ago.

The elm leaf beetle is a leaf-eating parasite which will continually defoliate a tree depriving it of the ability to restore its stored sugars and starches or food source. This is known as skeletonising the leaf. This also detracts from the beauty we find in the dense exotic foliage that is in contrast to the sparser, woody look of a lot of our natives. Importantly it detracts from the health of the tree and left untreated it will in time, put the tree into decline.

The Elm Leaf Beetle only affects some varieties of the "Ulmus" genus – the Golden Elm and the English Elm – and when the season is prime for the elm leaf beetle and they are in abundance, I have noticed activity in some Mulberry trees.

It is a small insect around 6mm long and yellowish to olive green with black stripes. The beetles hibernate in sheltered places during winter like wood piles and roof eaves, and have been known to be in buildings behind paintings. They emerge in spring to feed on the young leaves. The beetles lay tiny lemon-coloured eggs in clumps on the underside of leaves in spring, which hatch in 7-10 days.

Symptoms and Diagnosis

Symptoms first appear in early summer.

- Leaves turn brown (Skeletonise) in the interior foliage initially, spreading to the entire canopy.
- Trees might display a mixture of healthy and diseased foliage and shoots.
- Left untreated for 5 to 6 years symptoms of dieback appear, dead tips on the outer canopy
- Cracks in the trunk or peeling bark are severe results of die back or the tree's decline.



TREATMENT

As there are numerous species of Elm trees in the district and no known predators of the beetle have been discovered, eradication of the insect is a romantic notion at this stage.

Treatment and control of the insect has been quite successful, however. A systemic injection of the chemical Confidor leaves a foul taste throughout the leaves for up to 3 years. It will only be localised in that particular tree.

I have been advised that spraying the clusters through winter or their dormant stage will help but has proven to be a difficult messy job as the chemical is not contained in the system.

I turned back the clock, a hundred years past and heard laughter echo again. Shadows on whitewash, candle light dancing and spectres of drinkers remain.


Can I hear songs in the Parlour Room dust, the organ untuned, out of key? These walls tell stories of some secrets held and no one will dare disagree.

END OF AN ERA

James O'Neill and his wife Gwenda Holt bought a weekender in Mudgee in 1997.

James had spent decades working in hospitality including stints in some of Sydney's top restaurants including Catalina, Rose Bay, as well as owning his own café. It did not take long for him to realise Mudgee was in desperate need of good coffee.

In 2000 they decided to relocate and not long after, The Butcher Shop Café was established, serving Mudgee's first on-premises roasted beans that could be smelt all the way down Church Street.

It was just the beginning for a string of firsts that would permanently change the shape of Mudgee dining and entertainment for the better, including being the first café to host outside tables in 2000, followed closely by Elton's in Market Street.

In its first iteration, Butcher Shop Café was also open for dinner both Friday and Saturday nights, seating up to 55 people and running for 8 years – bookings were always essential.

The Butcher Shop will be remembered for its lavish breakfasts always accompanied by thick handcut wedges of toast, and for its monthly hosted art exhibitions paired with the launch of a new wine from select Mudgee cellar doors. James sold posters, artwork, sculptures, mainly from renowned but local artists who always had time to showcase at the Butcher Shop Café including Nigel White. Linda Jackson and Luke Sciberras.

Wine dinners were hosted and celebrity chefs visited. Paul McMahon from Catalina and his chilli crabs matched with great local wines is well remembered. Then there was the Frog Rock Wines Reidel masterclass dinner where the café was rammed to capacity with food and wine matching.

In 2003, short film festival Mudfest - based on Sydney's Tropfest - was launched in the Butcher Shop Café hosting 80 people. In 2007, James O'Neill and James Loneregan were the only locals to make the final of the festival. Mudfest quickly grew and became an annual event hosted by winery Elliott Rocke, then finding a new home at Bunnamagoo and attracting over 2000 people.

In 2009, James opened a Gulgong Butcher Shop Café. New management took over in 2011 and continues today.

In 2013 James established High Cube, a unique café development at South Mudgee made from shipping containers and designed by local architect Cameron Anderson which is now known as Indigiearth. In the 2015 NSW Country Division Architecture Awards, High Cube and Cameron won the James Barnet Award, the Public & Commercial Architecture Award and jointly won the Small Projects Award.

In 2015 James established Black Wines with prominent winemaker Robert Black, a great local drop that can be tasted in most of Mudgee's pubs as well as delivered locally and beyond.



The Butcher Shop has always been something of a hot spot in town for both locals and tourists; James and Gwenda – who broke her own ground with her Head Gardner salon – have themselves become Mudgee icons.

Thanks to James Mudgee has become a town of coffeeholics where coffee shops have proliferated and thrived. But James is still the barista that has his regulars' coffee ready before they have left the car.


After 25 years, James and Gwenda have decided to spend more time with their children and granddaughter and to travel and spend time in Bali – but they will always call Mudgee home.

They will both be sadly missed as they were a huge part of the tourism growth in early 2000 in Mudgee. They will be remembered for good coffee, great one-liners and Gwenda's amazing haircuts.

The Butcher Shop will continue with new owners Tayla Robinson from Bespoke Catering & Co taking over in early November, continuing the Butcher Shop name and traditions.




BOOK REVIEW

CPSA GULGONG AND DISTRICT COMBINED PENSIONERS

How amazing has the last month

been? With the passing of her Gracious Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, an era has gone. As one commentator said "It is likely that no one alive today will ever see another British queen with the heir apparent being Prince William of Wales and the next in succession Prince George. For our members, it will be a time of reflection as a lot of them were Children or young adults when the Queen was crowned. Other have only ever known one monarch in their lifetime and are wondering how the Australian political landscape will evolve. Mr Albanese has committed to not reviewing the current political system during his government's first term. We wait!!

Pensioners are in line for an increase, but the discussion is about the lag between the pension rise

and the inflation rate or consumer price index (CPI) which drives the rise. Without the CPI increase the pension does not increase so there is always the lag. The CPSA newspaper, The Voice, states that he pension will rise by 4% which sounds fabulous until it is realised that the inflation rate is 6.9% so an effective decrease in spending power of 2.9%. This is compound on the last rise, so the true rate is something like 3.5% in real terms. Fuel is up by 13% which causes the increase in all goods transported, as well as filling up the family car to buy those goods.

The good news is that the income limits for Commonwealth Seniors Health Cards will increase significantly. The Health Card can be used to access medication under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme.

To ensure that you are receiving all your entitled benefits, whether or not you get them now, it is a good idea to make an appointment with Centrelink every couple of years to see how things have changed and whether you are eligible for new entitlements such as the Health Card.

SUPPORTING HEART BEATS ALL AROUND THE REGION

The Heart of Cudgegong – Defib Project continues to go from strength to strength as it supports existing Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) owners in the region and receives new devices to install at central locations. The database of existing AEDs has grown from a starting point of around 59 devices to now nudging 111.

"We are thrilled with how the project is progressing and the response we have received from both business and community has been overwhelmingly positive", Ali Broinowksi, Project Lead and President of Business Mudgee, said today. "Everyone we have spoken to has seen the benefit of having more AEDs in our region, the challenge is to ensure that the AEDs are accessible 24/7 so if someone goes into a cardiac arrest, the first responder is able to access the AED device quickly. We believe only a small percentage of those 111 devices are available to everyone at any time".

Over the past few months the Heart of Cudgegong – Defib Project has formed partnerships with a number of organisations to gather information and also source AEDs. The Kandos/Rylstone Chamber of Commerce is researching AED availability in their part of the Council area and Heart of the Nation, and the founder Yellow Wiggle Greg Page, continues to be a key partner. So far the Project Working Party has sourced new AEDs from:

Mid-Western Regional Council: two AEDs that will be placed in 24/7 accessible locations across the region.

Heart of the Nation: has donated two AEDs. One has been installed in high profile, publicly accessible area on the wall in front of Blooms' CBD pharmacy on Church Street Mudgee and the other will be installed on the Sydney Road Mudgee, in front of Strait Up Cranes.

Bowdens Silver: has donated one AED that will be installed at Lue Public School for the local community to access in times of need.

There are three keys to success of this project:

 Installing AEDs in locations where anyone can access them in an emergency

- Ensuring every AED is listed on the Heart of the Nation app so everyone can find an AED when they need it, even in business hours.
- Encouraging everyone to download the Heart of the Nation app to their phone, so that in a split second they can find their closest AED.

"We completely understand that some AED owners may not be able to make their AEDs accessible all the time, but we still encourage everyone to list their device on the Heart of the Nation app. How good would it be to know that you played a small role in saving someone's life?" Ms Broinowski said. "If you would like to add your AED to our database or would like a hand to connect to the app, please contact us today. We are happy to help."

To extend information sharing and understanding of all things AED, Greg Page will be visiting Mudgee on Friday 14 October. Local safety and AED suppliers will be in attendance to answer any questions. Stay tuned for confirmation of venue details and timing.

In the meantime, everyone is encouraged to make contact through the project Facebook page @cudgeegongdefibproject or by emailing defib@businessmudgee.com.au to share AED location, access information or other ideas.

Gulgong Public School achieving 69% of students achieving or exceeding their expected growth between Years 3 and 5 in Numeracy and similar results for Reading.

This is an amazing result for a small school of only 320 students in our region. It shows that Public Schools in NSW continually provide excellence in education at our doorstep.

\$4,000 GRANT WILL KEEP THE RYLSTONE KANDOS VOLUNTARY RESCUE SQUAD SQUEEKY CLEAN

After participating in messy or muddy rescues, members of the Rylstone Kandos VRA Rescue Squad will soon be able to soak their soiled PPE at the team shed.

Thanks to a \$4,000 grant from the former Coalition Government, the group will purchase a team washing machine so members won't have to bring any grubby gear home with them.

The funding, awarded through the *Volunteer Grants program*, will also see the group set up several new computers at the Rescue Station, helping volunteers to easily access information and connect to video conferences in an emergency.

Volunteers are the backbone of communities in the bush, lending their time, skills and energy to make our villages, towns and cities the best they can be. With resilience, selflessness, and a fair bit of sweat, the amazing

volunteers at the Rylstone Kandos VRA Rescue Squad go the extra mile, answering calls for help – no matter the hour - from the local community.

It's been a rough few years for the region, with the drought, the Black Summer Bushfires, the COVID-19 pandemic, and flooding events taking it in turns to devastate our country communities. While the recovery from these disasters is going to take years, its groups like the Rylstone Kandos VRA Rescue Squad which forego sleep and sustenance to help keep us safe when things turn sour.

The Volunteer Grants program was established by the former Coalition Government in recognition of the invaluable work of Australia's volunteers. Funding of \$1,000 to \$5,000 is still available for eligible not-for-profit community organisations to assist their volunteers and encourage volunteering.



DIXONS LONG POINT CROSSING UPDATE

Inflation and increasing construction costs have impacted the Dixons Long Point project but the campaign for the new crossing, and the determination to build it, are as strong as ever

Tenders for the project have now come back and due to rising construction costs of up to 30%, the tenders have come in up to \$10 million above budget. It's an unfortunate reality of the surging inflation which Australia is facing, and it's affecting projects across the country.

The tenders also identify some additional costs in improving access roads on the Mudgee side in order to get heavy vehicles and components in.

Given construction costs are expected to rise even further, and also the need for a back-up contingency, the minimum amount needed to progress the project would be a further \$15 million to \$20 million.

There are now two courses of action in order to progress the project – seek more funding from the Federal Government or look at proceeding with the project with existing funding but reducing the scale.

Reducing the scale would involve improving the roads on the existing route (as opposed to a new crossing site) and reducing the scope of the crossing to a lower-level bridge or culvert crossing.

The previous Coalition government committed almost \$35 million to the project with \$5 million of that being an election commitment, and most of the \$29.8 from previous budgets is still there in the kitty.

It will now be a case of working up some costings with Mid-Western Regional Council and then sitting down with the new government in Canberra to discuss the best way forward.

I'm still fully committed to seeing the 170-year vision become a reality. I'll do everything I can to see it finished either in its current form with additional funding, or in a scaled back version.

I'd like to thank Mid-Western Regional Council and project leader Ray Kearns for their outstanding work as well as all of the representatives of our local Indigenous organisations and nearby farmers, whom we've worked very closely with on this project.


